PRESIDENT'S REPORT

The Freshers 'Party in September was followed by the AGM and an outstanding Annual Lecture by Professor Gary Gerstle on 'The 2016 (American) Election in its Historical Perspective '- particularly relevant just a few weeks before the actual event. We were happy to see a number of sixth formers from the Royal Grammar School in the audience and they were keen questioners of the speaker at the end of his talk. CALENDAR OF EVENTS (2017)

Northumbria Police, Forth Banks Station, Newcastle.

Saturday, February 11, 2017

This is a recently opened, purpose-built operational centre said to contain "the best cells in the country"! Built on the site of the Goods Warehouse and Kings House on Forth Banks, it is the base for 600 Northumbria Police officers and staff working in Newcastle and Gateshead, and is the result of three years of building and a £36m investment. Our behind-the-scenes tour will introduce us to modern high-tech methods of policing in the North East and to a state-of-the-art facility. Lunch will follow at the Thai Mantra Dining Restaurant.

Annual Dinner, Northern Counties Club, Newcastle.

Wednesday, March 15, 2017

For our annual dinner 2017 we return to a venue that has proved to be very popular with members. Saturday, April 22, 2017

We end with a visit to Blagraves House, once owned by the widow of Miles Forest, who was reputed to have been involved in the disappearance of the Princes in the Tower.

Spring Walk, Belsay.

Saturday, May 20, 2017

The combination of a garden tour and a walk seems to suit our members very well, and so this year we will be heading for Belsay Hall in the Northumberland countryside. English Heritage takes care of the 14th century castle, with its later additions, and the Hall, which was built in the early 19th century in neo-classical style. Building stone for the Hall was quarried from the grounds of the castle and a quarry garden created. Our visit will begin with a walk through the quarry garden to the castle and back, followed by lunch in the Hall's Victorian Tearoom, and then a choice of a shorter (Cragwood) or longer (Bolam Lake to Shaftoe Crags) walk (or a visit to the Hall).

Summer Outing, Wetland Centre, Washington.

NEW COMMITTEE MEMBERS

It is a great pleasure to welcome two new members to the executive committee of the Northumbrian Cambridge Association, husband and wife Peter and Liz Atkins. Peter read Geography at Downing College from 1968 to 1971 and then continued with doctoral research at Cambridge from 1971 to 1974. This was followed by short spells at Leicester University and University College Swansea, and then by 34 years at Durham University, from where he retired in 2014 as Professor of Geography. Peter's specialism is the historical geography of food and he is a past President of the International Commission for Research on European Food History. Liz worked in the Churchill Archives Centre at Churchill College from 1970 to 1974. She graduated in the History of Art from Northumbria University and has published on the origins of the Laing Gallery in Newcastle. She was a teacher for many years before retiring in 2012.



MONEY MATTERS

The failure of members to renew their subscriptions to the Association has been of concern to the committee for some time. With approximately half the membership not paying, this means a loss to the society of about £500 annually. At £5.00 a year per person, the cost of membership is extremely low, and very good value in terms of the service provided (organisation of events, management of finances, newsletters and postage, committee time and travel, etc.). In order to regularise this, and to allow closer monitoring of subscriptions, the committee now proposes that all subscriptions will be due, at the latest, by March 1 annually. This means that your next subscription will be due by March 1, 2017.

Payment can be made by cheque (made out to Northumbrian Cambridge Association, not NCA, please), by standing order (most desirable, since you do not have to remember to renew it every year thereafter), or by bank transfer (HSBC sort code 40 34 18; account number 60618446. IN MEMORIAM: Peter Willis



We were saddened to learn of the death in August of Dr Peter Willis, an active member and former Hon. Secretary of the Northumbrian Cambridge Association. Peter had a distinguished career both as a practicing architect and as an academic. A graduate of King's College, Newcastle, he went on to Corpus Christi College, Cambridge, where he did research, under Sir Niklaus Pevsner, on the 18th century landscape designer, Charles Bridgeman. Further research led to the reward of a Ph.D. by Cambridge in 1962. His professional life thereafter combined both architectural work and a readership in the history of architecture at Newcastle University, a post he held until his retirement in 1990. Thereafter, he expanded his interests in theology and music, with degrees from Durham in both fields. His work in the field of architecture was recognized by his (invited) membership of the principal architectural societies and societies of antiquaries. Our own association knew him as an active and genial person, a good companion at many NCA events and an efficient and hard-working Hon. Secretary. Jack Lindsay (Trinity, 1952-55) died on December 27. Jack was not only an active member of the Association but was also a former Secretary. He attended the Christmas Lunch in 2015, when we celebrated his 84th birthday. A man of many interests (music, cooking, bread and coffee making, hifi, etc.), Jack was, among other things, responsible for musical recitals held at St Cuthbert's Church, Allendale (we advertised one of these recently), which inspired us to add a musical event to our own annual NCA programme. His funeral was held at St Cuthbert's Church, Allendale, on Saturday, January 7, and was attended by the President and Hon. Secretary, along with Professor Ian Fells and Mrs Hazel Fells. Our deepest sympathy goes out to Jack's family for their loss.
