## PRESIDENT'S REPORT

May I begin by wishing all our members and associates a very happy and healthy New Year. I hope you have had an enjoyable Christmas break and that you are looking forward to an active and interesting year in 2020. This year represents the 90<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the founding of the Northumbrian Cambridge Association, and so it is a very special one for us. We will be celebrating the occasion during our Annual Dinner at the Northern Counties Club in Newcastle on Wednesday, March 11. The Cambridge University Development and Alumni Relations team are preparing a special banner for us, we will have some invited guests, James Wright will giving an account of the early history of the Association, and Professor Ian Fells will be regaling us with some of his reminiscences of Cambridge in the 1950s.

Looking back for the moment, we have had a number of successful events in the autumn of 2019, beginning with the Welcome to Freshers party held on September 16 at Mincoffs Solicitors in Newcastle. This event continues to grow from year to year. On this occasion seven NCA members were there to welcome 44 first year students, a new record. This was followed by the Annual General Meeting and Annual Lecture at the Royal Grammar School on September 27. Our speaker this year, Professor Tony Badger, formerly Paul Mellon Professor of American History and Master of Clare College, Cambridge, gave a fascinating talk on "The Kennedys and the Gores", brought right up to date by the fact that he had recently shared a platform with Al Gore. Our November musical event at the Sage was a concert by the Pitmen Poets, who told the story of the North East mining industry in poetry, picture and song. This followed on from a convivial meal in the Sage Brasserie and was much enjoyed by all. Our year finished with our now traditional Christmas events: a splendid Christmas lunch at the County Hotel and our festive afternoon tea and film at the Tyneside Cinema.

We can now look forward to a year of varied and interesting events, detailed in the Calendar which you will find later in this Newsletter, but just to whet your appetite, in February we will visit the Discovery Museum, where we will be given two guided tours, one of this historic building and the other of the museum's excellent costume collection. Our Spring Outing in April is one with a difference; we will be welcomed to Kirkley

Hall Zoological Garden, on the outskirts of Ponteland, where we will learn about the zoo's programme of conservation, will meet some of the animals and can choose a woodland walk and/or a visit to the walled garden. Our Spring Walk will be incorporated into a visit to Raby Castle, following on from a guided tour of the castle itself. As usual there will be a shorter and a longer walk for you to choose from. The Summer Outing will see us heading north again, to Seahouses, where we will have lunch together at the Olde Ship Inn and then will embark on a Serenity Cruises catamaran for a visit to the Farne Islands and a stopover on Inner Farne. On a preparatory excursion, Andrena and I saw not only seals, cormorants, gulls, puffins, etc., but also a school of dolphins that tracked our boat as we sailed back into Seahouses Harbour. After the summer break, we will have repeats of the Freshers Party, the AGM and Annual Lecture, a November musical event, the Christmas lunch and the increasingly popular Festive Afternoon Tea and Film (details in the July newsletter). We do hope you will join us for as many of these events as possible.

In conclusion, I have to inform you that this is the last year in which I and Andrena will serve as President and Secretary respectively of the society. We have served on the committee, and subsequently in these posts, for a considerable number of years and we feel it is time for us to step back and allow others to take over the running of the organisation. Fortunately we have an active and involved committee, including a very competent and hard-working Treasurer, and two members of the committee have agreed to stand for appointment to the positions of President and Secretary. These will be proposed for ratification at the Annual General Meeting on September 25, at which point Andrena and I will step down. Other nominations are of course welcome. Also, the July 2020 newsletter will be our last, and the publication will be taken over by Professor Gilbert Cockton, who currently handles our website. We can truly say that it has been an honour and a pleasure to serve the society. We have made many friends through its activities and we look forward to continuing to participate as members.

### AGM AND ANNUAL LECTURE, September 27, 2019

The Annual General Meeting of the association took place at the Royal Grammar School on Friday, September 27. The continuing officers and committee members were duly elected, two new Committee members were appointed, Dr Peter Cleland (Selwyn, 1966-69, Medicine) and Arnold Fairless (St. John's, 1964-67), and the President warmly thanked Professor Peter Atkins and his wife, Elizabeth Atkins, who were stepping down. The buffet was supplied by Boldon Farmhouse Pantry, as usual, and the wines by Michael Jobling. Professor Tony Badger, former lecturer in the History Department of Newcastle University (1971 to 1991), Paul Mellon Professor of American History at Cambridge and Master of Clare College until 2014, and currently Professor of American History at Northumbria University in Newcastle upon Tyne, gave an excellent lecture on 'The Kennedys and The Gores' and this was followed by lively questions, and a vote of thanks from Professor Ian Fells.



### AUTUMN CONCERT, November 24, 2019

Thirteen members and guests joined us for dinner at the Sage Brasserie this year, and 17 attended the Pitmen Poets concert afterwards. The meal at the Brasserie was excellent, and the concert was a lively one. In the course of the evening, we were treated to folk music from the North East mining tradition by four splendid musicians whose playing of guitars, and other stringed instruments, as well as accordion and even spoons, combined with North East humour, made for a memorable occasion.

45 members and guests registered for this event, a record for us! After drinks in the upstairs Bar at 12, we moved through to the Mozart Suite for our traditional 3-course Christmas lunch. The President welcomed everyone, introduced the Committee members present and outlined our 2020 programme. 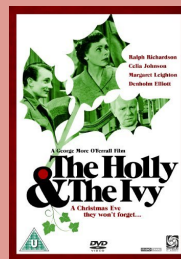
### PRE-CHRISTMAS FRESHERS' REUNION, December 11, 2019

Our spring outing this year will be to Kirkley Hall Zoological Gardens. We will meet at 10.00. Morning coffee will be available in the Orangery Tearoom, after which, at 10.30, we shall have a talk on the zoo's conservation policy in the elegant conference room of Kirkley Hall. With the expertise of a Kirkley guide, we will be introduced to some of the zoo's inhabitants in the discovery room, with the opportunity to hold some of them. From about 11.30 onwards, we shall explore the zoo for ourselves, and at 12.30, we'll have lunch in the conference room. To follow in the afternoon (13.45-14.45), we shall have an optional woodland walk (of approximately 1 hour), led by the President and Secretary, after which you can visit the walled garden, and/or return to the Orangery Tea Room for afternoon tea.

Our spring walk this year will be to Raby Castle and its estate. Our trip to the Farne Islands will begin with lunch at 11.45 at the Olde Ship Inn in Seahouses. Following lunch we will join a Serenity Cruises catamaran at 13.45 for a trip round the Farne Islands, with an hour's stop-off on Inner Farne to see the bird life nesting on the cliffs, the old lighthouse and St Cuthbert's Chapel. On board our boat will be a wildlife expert who will be able to point out the main features, both animate and inanimate, of the islands. Expect to see the Farnes' colony of grey seals, along with cormorants, kittiwakes, gulls, terns and the loveable puffins. If we are lucky we may also see dolphins in the waters between the Farnes and the Northumberland coast.

### EXTRAORDINARY DONS: Kathleen Raine (1908-2003)

Wendy Bond writes: With a membership as large as that of NCA, we must span not only many colleges, but many interesting if not astonishing Dons that we have known, shared a staircase with, etc. Could this become a regular short feature in the Newsletter?

Wendy kicks off with this interesting portrait of Kathleen Raine, 'the poet, whose happy childhood in Great Bavington shines through much of her poetry. I met her first at a Girton English department drinks do, clad in a surely hand-dyed stiff green cotton robe hand printed with leaves. She gave a seminar on Blake in her faraway gentle voice that hovered way above our heads, and could occasionally be seen wafting along the corridors or through the trees in Girton's great gardens. She was much more down to earth in the tiny cottage just over the Cumbrian border where I met her again many years later. We had a great friend in common, too: the painter Winifred Nicholson who features in a couple of her very accessible local poems. But her Girton presence - and most of her criticism and thought were impressive if incomprehensible at the time. It would be good in these times when universities are reduced to businesses rather than seats of intellectual learning, to hear of other legendary Cambridge dons.

receivership in 2011

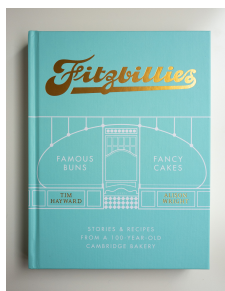
—abandoning a life in London to rebuild this legendary bakery. The Fitzbillies book celebrates a

Now I research, repair and restore old clocks – the mechanisms that measured history.
